Gentleman from the 147th.

REP. BINGHAM: (147th)

Mr. Speaker, I move acceptance and passage of the Joint Committee's favorable report.

DEPUTY SPEAKER:

Question is on acceptance and passage. Will you remark, please. REP. BINGHAM: (147th)

Yes, Mr. Speaker. This puts into statutory language the practice of the Legislative Commissioner Office which states that the act last passed which is not in conflict with a prior act shall be the law of the state, and only in the case of irreconcilable conflict will the last passed act become the law of the state.

This clarifies a recent decision of the Supreme Court of the State of Connecticut and has been requested by the Legislative Commissioner's Office.

I move acceptance and passage of the bill.

DEPUTY SPEAKER:

Any further remarks? Gentleman from the 104th. REP. AJELLO: (104th)

Mr. Speaker, in the distinguished chairman's explanation, he indicated that -- he did not indicate, rather, that the last passed act was to control in acts passed at the same session of the General Assembly. I wonder whether it's the intention that this bill cover acts of prior General Assemblies or if that's any kind of an issue. I'd like to have that explained for the

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purposes of the record, then I'll have another further question. hw

Gentleman from the 147th.

REP. BINGHAM: (147th)

The acts are to be read together and it's my understanding that it will cover acts of prior General Assemblies, yes.

DEPUTY SPEAKER:

Is the gentleman from the 104th prepared for his second question?

REP. AJELLO: (104th)

Yes, sir. That, from my reading of the file is not what it says, because it says that when two or more acts passed at the same session of the General Assembly.

REP. BINGHAM: (147th)

Through you Mr. Speaker, I don't think it's necessary to say it if in the following session of the General Assembly we pass an act amending a statute, I think obviously that would amend the prior session's act. I think that's an implicit reading in the bill and I don't think it must necessarily be set forth in expressed terms. I think explicitly that's what the bill means, expressly the bills that discusses two acts passed in the same General Assembly.

DEPUTY SPEAKER:

Gentleman from the 104th.

REP. AJELLO: (104th)

I think that clarifies it and I thank the gentleman for the explanation.

Mr. Speaker, another issue this seems to raise and which it might be useful to discuss in talking about this bill is that there is some case law in the State of Connecticut that is confusing as to the applicability of special acts as opposed to general acts and whether or not the passage of a general act following a special act repeals the earlier special act. This is of importance in communities which have charters granted by special act and becomes the subject of law suits fairly often or at least it has in the past and I wonder whether the chairman has any thought about that.

#### DEPUTY SPEAKER:

Will the gentleman from the 147th care to answer question No. 2?

REP. BINGHAM: (147th)

Yes, it will affect. It says, of a public or special act, only if it's adopted in the same session.

DEPUTY SPEAKER:

Gentleman from the 104th.

REP. AJELLO: (104th)

I don't disagree with what the gentleman says but I think that we may be creating a new area for litigation at least. If we're going to treat special and general acts adopted in the same session on a different basis from those adopted from one session to another, it seems to me we're not doing anything here to clarify the law in Connecticut and I think that really it would be an ideal opportunity to do that. I think we're leaving something up in the air.

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REP. BINGHAM: (147th)

Through you Mr. Speaker, I respectfully submit that the fear is not well-founded. A general act through home rule cannot amend a special act and therefore I do not believe that it will cause litigation.
